The time has now come for her to hang up her duster and wring out her mop! Thank you, Pennie, for all your hard work. This coincides with several on the rota not being able to continue as they had before. The DCC is aware that a request to "clean the church" can seem like a tall order, so as from October the current rota will cease to exist, and cleaning will become a communal activity with whoever turns up on the appropriate day in October – dates to follow! I know that Pennie will be in touch with people to thank everyone. Anyone is welcome to the afternoon as we know some will welcome the company, and there



may be some knitting...!. **There will also be tea and cake!** Many remarked what a good day it was when we cleaned the church after HAP, and many hands make light work. So if you are free, please come. If you can hoover or sit and polish or make tea, good. If you can sit and chat to others, good. This is something that will evolve as we work out how

to clean together! However, we still will need a "Housekeeping Coordinator". Job spec – keep an eye on the hoovers and empty/get them emptied if necessary. Ensure adequate cleaning materials in the cleaning cupboard, hoover bags etc. Remind Church Warden of when spring clean or other cleaning is necessary. Keep an eye on the general cleanliness of the building and report any findings to Mike Burden, Church Warden (Buildings) and Chris. Note that this job spec does not involve any actual cleaning or organising rotas!! Nor is there any responsibility for housekeeping issues in the Kitchen area. Offers, suggestions? In the meantime, if we could each take responsibility for the Church Rooms. Anyone who is physically able



may find a broom or clean the WC or washbasin if it needs doing. The cleaning cupboard is behind the double white doors in the foyer and cleaning materials for the WC etc will be in the wall cupboard in the "smallest room" in due course. On this subject we plan to install a larger washbasin with easier to use tap and a plug in the plug hole! While we are in this area, have you heard of **TOILET TWINNING - A WATER AND SANITATION INITIATIVE - FLUSHING AWAY POVERTY, ONE TOILET AT A TIME.** It also makes life a lot safer for young girls who are often attacked when using the bush. "By donating £60 to twin your toilet, you help those in desperate poverty to have access to a proper latrine, clean water and the information they need to be healthy. Your smallest room becomes the proud owner of a certificate, complete with a colour photo of its twin and GPS coordinates so you can look up your twin's location." www.toilettwinning.org

If you would like to contribute any items, or contribute to the cost, please see Mike K or Marilyn to check that the items have not already been given.



(Mike and Marilyn have oversight of the kitchen area on behalf of the District Church Council.) Complete set of cutlery 3 doz of knife, fork, desert & soup spoons 3 doz ceramic soup/desert bowls; Tongs/Salad Servers/Spatulas/Serving slice/Ladle/Wooden spoons; Condiment set; Two large stock type pots for use on Hob (to heat soup/stew type food etc); A large lightweight T pot; Heat protector mats/trivets; Chopping/bread board; Folding trolley

**Resources in Church.** At the back of the Church – in the carpeted corner you will find: cards for sale (50% to church funds) – instructions on the card stand; a selection of books which may be borrowed; the knitting basket which receives 6" squares and poppies; a bag of bags for use with Samara's Aid; children's books and colouring for children and adults; photos of the Summer Buffet; photos of the Church Council. ## News from the Foundation for Relief and Reconciliation in the Middle East

Teleskuf ('Bishop's Hill' in Aramaic) is a Christian village in northern Iraq; captured by ISIS in 2014 and 2016; on both occasions the jihadis were driven out. The second battle made international headlines as a US Navy SEAL was killed. Since ISIS' defeat, the parish is returning to a state of normality, but there are no jobs and the security situation is precarious. In April we went to Teleskuf and filmed some of the St George's Day festivities. An ancient people need help. We spoke to local journalist, Loav Azabo, interviewing him on the sports pitch in front of the massive 'tel' (hill) which overlooks the village... Last year, the first people to return to the village erected a huge crucifix on top of the hill to symbolise their return. While more people have made the trip home, Mr Azabo told us about the enormous challenges facing the returnees: "We hope there will be more attention on the village of Teleskuf because the thing that we lack is jobs which are still few. They [the townsfolk] returned and tried to restore life but there is a need for projects and things that brings life back. And the most important thing is to keep these people steadfast in their land and keep them proud of this hill and keep them proud of Teleskuf generally and make them proud of each other." Our plan of action With your support, we have already helped the village to create a children's play area. We also have ambitious plans for a business development programme to boost the local economy. It is vital Christian towns and villages in northern Iraq have sustainable enterprises if they are going to make the next big step towards full recovery. Sadly, international funding has been slow to reach places like this. The people of Teleskuf and the Nineveh Plain urgently need support. The land is currently in the grip of drought. The Tigris and the Euphrates are drying up. Temperatures have soared to an unbearable 45 degrees. The drought has hit farmers hard and little is being done to help them. One of the projects our Nineveh SEED programme will fund is deep water wells and linked irrigation systems for villages like Teleskuf. FRRME, PO Box 229, Petersfield, Hants, GU32 9DL, United Kingdom.
