100 Years On Commemorative Display in Church – Please Support

<u>Sunday 11th November – Remembrance Service starts at 10.45</u> We hope to listen to events broadcast from Whitehall for about 5 minutes, around the time of the national Silence.

<u>12.30 –</u> We may only have one bell, but it will be rung at the same time as bells ring out across the nation, as they did exactly 100 years previously. It may be rung again in the evening – watch the pew sheet. The rest of the month looks like this:

Social Concern Items from October

(1) Modern slavery is hidden in plain sight on our high streets. The National Crime Agency thinks there are tens of thousands of people being exploited in the UK, forced to work long hours, for little or no pay, and under threat of violence. Some of those people are being exploited in hand car washes, which in recent years have sprung up across the country in their thousands. Many hand car washes are legitimate businesses, but some of them are not. Police raids in hand car washes in towns and cities up and down the country have unearthed victims living in horrendous conditions. THE PROBLEM Although law enforcement and the government are clear that this problem exists, there is no reliable data on just how widespread it is. This lack of information means that victims could be falling through the net, becoming more enmeshed in the cycle of exploitation. We (Clewer Initiative of the CE) have spoken to the police, the National Crime Agency and the Gangmasters & Labour Abuse Authority about how the church can help them solve this and bring these hidden victims into the light. The Safe Car Wash app has been developed by the CE and allows the public to engage with the problem by enabling the largest community intelligence gathering exercise ever attempted in the UK. Download the free app onto your phone and then when at a hand car wash, open the app and complete a short survey about the working conditions. (2) Rough Sleepers. Many are concerned about the plight of such people but don't know what to do. Contact Streetlink (it is anonymous) and log your concern and the individual will be connected with local services that can support them. www.streetlink.org.uk. If you are not on line you know someone who is. (3) South West Community Chaplaincy – the Peninsula Initiative. On Prisons Sunday I mentioned this organisation which I helped to found over 10 years ago. Funded by charitable grant making trusts it works to extend the pastoral care of the Prison Service Chaplaincy through the Prison Gate to the harsh reality outside. Mentors support released prisoners, working with them to navigate their way through the complexities of benefits, housing, work, attitudes etc. More information on www.swcc-pi.org

We will load another container in Worthing on Monday and will still have some aid to load from Worthing, Amersham & Essex next week too. The sixth container up in East Yorks will hopefully finish being filled by our amazing partners at Jacob's Well. God is good! Thanks so much also to our many partners, to name a few, Feed The Hungry, Link to Hope, Christian Hope International, The Entertainer, and Tom the farmer for letting us use your warehouses and barns. It makes this all possible. Thank you so much to everyone who has helped in any way.
